Overview

Statistics is the science of data collection, summarization, analysis, and interpretation. A central issue of statistics is how to make inferences about populations of interest, using data obtained from samples or designed experiments. Statistical techniques are applied extensively in virtually every branch of the physical, social, biological, and human sciences. Statistical methodologies and principles of inference are based heavily upon statistical theory, which, in turn has an essential underlying mathematical foundation.
