Welcome to New Chancellor

Robert Silver, BSc(Hons)

The University of Winnipeg's Board of Regents and Senate jointly elected well-known Winnipeg business and community leader Robert (Bob) Silver to serve as the University's 7th Chancellor, effective July 1, 2009.

Silver is President of Western Glove Works, co-owner of the Warehouse One retail chain, and co-owner of the Winnipeg Free Press and Brandon Sun. He is well-known as an active volunteer in our community, having chaired the United Way campaign and offered his skills and insights as co-chair of the Premier's Economic Advisory Council, co-chair of the Winnipeg Library Foundation, and board member with the Canadian Apparel Federation and Destination Winnipeg.



"Bob Silver has a keen understanding of the unique role that UWinnipeg can and is playing in the inner city, both in downtown redevelopment and in reaching out to remove barriers for students who are under-represented on campus," said Lloyd Axworthy, President & Vice-Chancellor, UWinnipeg. "I have been struck by his deep interest in the challenges and opportunities facing higher education, and as co-chair of the Premier's Economic Advisory Council, he has consistently promoted the position of universities in the community and their need for effective support."

During his 35 year business career, Silver has been extensively involved in reviewing internal management financial reporting and external audited and un-audited financial statements from various perspectives as an owner/investor, a member of senior management and as a board member. In addition, Silver has actively participated in acquisitions reviews, restructuring reviews and numerous negotiations with lenders and prospective lenders. He is broadly familiar with financial statement principals, and financing and taxation issues.

The position of Chancellor is a volunteer, renewable three-year term. Primary responsibilities include participating in Convocations and conferring degrees, participating in meetings of the Board of Regents, Senate, and committees, as well as assisting with fundraising and promoting the University. Silver will also serve on the Board of Directors of The University of Winnipeg Foundation.

George Ramsay Cook, BA (Hons), MA, PhD

Honorary Doctor of Laws

George Ramsay Cook is one of Canada's most notable historians, an accomplished public intellectual and an established academic who began his journey at United College. He is also known for his engaging wit.

Cook's historical work emphasizes the important role of documentation and evidence. He speaks to the importance of objectivity and the deconstructing of received opinions and mythologies. His writing has a deep regard for knowledge and informed self-consciousness. UWinnipeg professor Dr. Allen Mills describes him as having "a quiet prideful curiosity in his work in the endless adventure that is the Canadian nation and its history."

His love for Canada is reflected in his contributions to and probing critique of the debate about Canada's national purpose. He has explored the role of Canadian nationalism and has been an especially important voice in the dialogue with French Canadian intellectuals.

Cook has received numerous honours and awards, including election into the prestigious Fellowship of the Royal Society of Canada for his outstanding scholarly

achievements and the Tyrell Medal from the Royal Society, awarded for outstanding work in the history of Canada. He was bestowed the Governor General's Literary Award for Non-Fiction and is an Officer of the Order of Canada, one of Canadian highest honours, awarded for a lifetime of achievement.



He has taught at the University of Toronto and York University, and is currently Professor of History (Emeritus), York University. He has served as a visiting lecturer in many universities around the world including Harvard, Yale, the University of Vienna, University of Edinburgh and the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences.

Richard Graydon, BPEd, BEd, BA

Fellowship in The University of Winnipeg

Richard Graydon, a graduate of The University of Winnipeg, has dedicated his life to education and sound administrative practice. He spent many years as a principal with Luxton, William Whyte, Isaac Brock, Wellington and John M. King schools. He also served as President of the Principals' Association.

Graydon's extensive administrative skills served The University of Winnipeg well when he was appointed unanimously by the Board of Regents to assume the role of Chair of the Board during a period of transition for the University (2001-2003). Faced with a challenging financial situation, Graydon provided stable leadership and led the Board through discussions and consultations that laid the groundwork for improved financial health and strategic planning. Graydon also oversaw the establishment in April 2003 of The University of Winnipeg Foundation. The Foundation is dedicated to raising private funds and providing donor stewardship in support of the vision and mission of the University and its Collegiate. He led the

Board of Regents with courage and dignity through two transformative years.

Graydon also contributed significantly to the broader community as a volunteer board and committee member with organizations dedicated to improving the lives of vulnerable children



including the Children's Home of Winnipeg, the Children's Aid Society and Child and Family Services-Central.

The University of Winnipeg has benefited greatly from the dedication of Richard Graydon.



Mark Ruml, BA, MA, PhD

The Clarence Atchison Award for Excellence in Community Service

Mark Ruml has spent much of his professional and personal life immersing himself with openness and humility in the renaissance of Aboriginal spirituality among Canada's Indigenous people. As Assistant Professor, Religious Studies at The University of Winnipeg, he has devoted himself to the scholarly study of this renaissance while integrating the lived realities of First Nations people into his research and teaching.


Ruml has worked to make the teachings of Cree Elder Louis Bird more accessible to the broader community. He published "Respectful Methodology: Methodological and Ethical Issues in Aboriginal Religious Traditions" to help guide respectful research in First Nations communities. He has offered education and healing among inmates, and has been involved in teaching and developing curriculum in Children of the Earth School.

As a founding member of the White Buffalo Spiritual Society, a non-profit Aboriginal organization with charitable status, Ruml served as secretary of the Board of Directors (1998-2005) in a volunteer capacity, helping to obtain a site in Birds Hill Provincial Park in which to hold the annual Sundance ceremony. He attends sweatlodges, pow-wows,

sundances and other spiritual and social events that bind the First Peoples of the Great Plains.

His colleagues describe Ruml as kind, unpretentious and approachable.

Royden Loewen, BA (Hons), Cert. Ed., MA, PhD

The Erica and Arnold Rogers Award for Excellence in Research and Scholarship

When it comes to meaningful research in the area of Mennonite History, Professor Royden Loewen, stands out for his distinguished work. As a University of Winnipeg History professor and Chair in Mennonite Studies, Loewen has created an enormous body of scholarship devoted to the history of Mennonite communities on three continents. His scholarship has won prizes, inspired other researchers and illuminated many facets of ethno-cultural and social history, even those beyond the communities that are the subject of his studies.

Loewen is the author of 17 scholarly articles, 40 book reviews, 13 book chapters, four monographs, one co-authored monograph and one co-edited volume. He has convened or co-convened 17 conferences, organized eight major conferences and adjudicated a dozen book manuscripts. His 70-plus lectures and presentations only further add to his impressive resume.

From the chief editorial chair of the Journal of Mennonite Studies, Loewen directs and invites a vast range of scholarship delving into economics, gender, immigration and emigration, and adaption and persistence in religious faith and conduct – all with the aim of explaining

the survival and transformation of a major cultural group that retains high visibility in Manitoba, Canada, the United States, Mexico and Latin America.

The Erica and Arnold Rogers Award for Excellence in Research and Scholarship was established by Erica

and Arnold Rogers, friends of The University of Winnipeg. Dr. Rogers, a medical doctor, and his wife Erica, valued the contribution by faculty members to research and scholarship.

The Robin H. Farguhar Award for Excellence in Contributing to Self-Governance

Kenneth Meadwell is an inspiration to many in the Faculty of Arts where he has served since 1983 in a number of capacities. Significantly, he served as Department Chair a full thirteen years, a challenging assignment that he embraced with tireless energy and where he left his mark in contributing to the self-governance of the University.

Under Meadwell's leadership, the French Department grew to become the Department of French Studies and German Studies. Italian Studies and Spanish Studies were cultivated and the Department evolved into the Department of Modern Language and Literatures, fitting well within our mandate as a multicultural institution in a downtown setting. Overseeing this remarkable growth and paying close attention to the many administrative details, Meadwell still found time to remain accessible to students, faculty and staff.

In addition, Meadwell nurtured a stronger and more demanding Honours program and revived the Perpignan Program – Third Year Abroad Program, Université de Perpignan, France, negotiating successfully with the French authorities. The Program attracts students from several universities in Canada, including Lakehead, Regina,

Saskatoon, University of Alberta and University of British Columbia.

Meadwell's involvement with University governance was also felt as a member of the Board of Regents, Continuing Education and The University of Winnipeg Faculty Association.



For his many accomplishments, Kenneth Meadwell is the recipient of the Robin H. Farquhar Award for Excellence in Contributing to Self-Governance.

This award was established in 1989 by the University Board of Regents in honour of Dr. Robin H. Farquhar, the third President of The University of Winnipeg. It recognizes a University faculty or staff member who contributes significantly to the self-governance function of the University. Dr. Farquhar valued the efforts of those who volunteer their time to serve on committees, boards, and task forces, thus maintaining the traditional and important autonomous nature of a university.

The University Library, Ecological People in Action (EcoPIA)

The Campus Sustainability Recognition Award

The Library and EcoPIA are being recognized with the first Campus Sustainability Recognition Award for helping to reduce the environmental impact of the University's landfill waste. Michael Hohner, Acting University Librarian, working in partnership with members of EcoPIA, a campus student sustainability group, organized a series of *Book Rippin* parties. This process diverts journals and books that are removed from University collections from going to the landfill by removing book covers. Pages can then be recycled.

This proactive initiative by both parties has diverted an estimated 2.5 tonnes of paper from the landfill, and has now become an established process on campus.

Hohner has also been an active advocate of establishing duplex printing in the University library. Hohner established duplex printing as the default for copiers and printers in the library, which automatically prints on both sides of the paper, further reducing use (and waste) of paper.

The University of Winnipeg has established the annual Campus Sustainability Recognition Award for meritorious contributions to campus sustainability, which may be conferred to a faculty member, support staff or a university organization.



The University of Winnipeg Coat of Arms

The Coat of Arms of The University of Winnipeg was officially adopted by the governing bodies of the University during the academic session of 1972-73. The elements found within the Coat of Arms have been associated over the years with both Manitoba and Wesley Colleges, the ancestors of United College. The bunch of grapes in the lower portion of the inner shield derives from the Coat of Arms of Manitoba College. The grape symbol has its origin in the College seal adopted in the charter of 1871. The cross, the lamp, and the open book derive from the Coat of Arms of Wesley College, designed in 1897 by Dr. J.H. Riddell. The cross, the symbol of sacrificial service in the interest of humanity, was the basis for his design and upon it he placed a shield, the symbol of protection. The lamp, the symbol of light, also represents learning, to which the Colleges have been devoted to for over a century in the Province of Manitoba. The open book, representing instruction in the way of life and the bringing of understanding to the student, symbolizes knowledge in a general sense, although it may carry overtones of the Holy Scriptures in a more limited interpretation.

The motto, placed upon a scroll below, is the United College motto, her retained: Lux et Veritas Floreant (Let Light and Truth Flourish). The words catch the central import of the lamp (light) and the open book (truth), and express the hope that both may flourish (as the grape) in our country (the cross).



Academic Dress

cademic dress originated in medieval times to provide warmth in the damp halls of learning. In its present form it includes a gown, hood (worn over the shoulders), and a cap or mortarboard. All universities have distinctive dress for each degree offered which explains the variety seen in the academic procession.

University of Winnipeg academic dress conforms to the North American Intercollegiate Code. All graduates wear a black gown which varies according to the degree conferred. The bachelor's gown is worn closed in front and is distinguished by its pointed sleeves. The master's gown is designed to be worn either open or closed in front and has closed sleeves with an opening to free the hands. The front portion of the sleeve below the opening has a long semicircular cut-out. Doctorate gowns also may be worn open or closed. They are faced with velvet.

The edging colour on the hood indicates the faculty in which a degree is conferred: Theology – red; Science – gold; Education – blue; Arts – white. The width of edging is determined by the degree: three inches for doctors; two inches for masters and bachelors. Hoods are lined in red with a white chevron.

Honorary doctors' gowns are red in colour and are faced with white velvet. They are worn with red Tudor bonnets. The hood colour signifies the honorary degree: white for Laws; golden yellow for Science; admiralty blue for Letters; purple for Divinity. Hoods are lined in red and white, The University of Winnipeg colours. Fellows wear a gown of blue with neither hat nor hood. Members of the University's senior administration wear gowns of varying colours. They do not wear hoods.

The Banner

The banner, prominently displaying the Coat of Arms, was unveiled in 1988. The volunteer effort of Pat Corner, Fran Farquhar, Susan Ferguson, and Sonya C. Wright took more than 1,000 hours. Over 400 meters of thread and 30 meters of wool material went into the project using traditional techniques such as quilting, embroidery, and crewel.
