Rules:

A single static PowerPoint slide is permitted (no slide transitions, animations or 'movement' of any kind, the slide is to be presented from the beginning of the presentation).

No additional electronic media are permitted.

No additional props are permitted.

Presentations are limited to three minutes maximum and challengers exceeding three minutes are disqualified.

Presentations are to be spoken word.

1. A 150-word abstract as a Word document.

2. Include your full name (and the names of any co-authors) and program information (i.e., Applied Computer Science, Theology, JMP Public Administration etc.) and contact email address.

3. Title of your presentation.

Include whether you would prefer to give an oral or a poster* presentation. Include the title of your presentation.

Include key words for your presentation. E.g., homilitics, White Nose Syndrome, Judith Butler.


