TAKING A HARD LOOK AT WAR . . .

Howard Barker's play takes a hard look at how the absurdities of war affect the people caught in the midst of it. find someone with whom they feel comfortable and trust. Claudette is able to share her own story of being an adult learner and of her life being changed in the past ten years, thanks to the University.

Claudette works on a one-to-one basis with students, but much of her time is spent going out into the community, (i.e., women's resource centres, high schools and adult learning centres) and letting others know about the opportunities that are available. In all, she went to 50 such places last year.

PARTNERSHIPS WITH THE COMMUNITY

The FrontStep Research Co-op (see photo below) is an example of the types of partnerships that UIC Studies maintains with the community. This

WHY STUDY ARTS?

There was a great turnout at Open House 2012 on Wednesday, February 22, 2012. At

the Arts booth, we had interesting conversations with many prospective students and their parents about the value of an Arts degree. It was reassuring to meet many who already understood that choosing Arts is a good decision. Indeed, a number of students already knew that Arts at the University of Winnipeg was for them this fall!

Acting Dean Glenn Moulaison gave a presentation to about 60 students entitled "Why Study Arts". He assured students that Arts graduates do AS WELL IF NOT BETTER than graduates of more "practical" disciplines, especially over the length of a career.

Research shows that employers want the types of skills taught in Arts: "the ability to communicate with people of other cultures, disciplines" (Anne Sado, President of George Brown College).

As for the new digital age being only for scientists and engineers, note that Larry Sanger (Wikipedia), Mark Zuckerberg (Facebook), Michael Everson (Unicode), or Michael Sperberg-McQueen (XML) all specialized or were interested in Classics, Philosophy, Celtic Studies and Comparative Literature at university.

Dr. Moulaison ended by listing several notable individuals, all of whom hold Arts degrees (see above left) and asking if the better question isn't ""Why not Arts?"
