CJ 2120 POLICING IN CANADA

PREREQUISITE: INTRODUCTION TO CRIMINAL JUSTICE (CJ 1101)

TEXTBOOK: Griffiths, Curt T. 2008. *Canadian Police Work – Second Edition.* Toronto, ON: Thomson-Nelson. [Required]

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course introduces students to various aspects of policing in Canada. We will explore the history of policing, aspects of patrol and investigations, the organization and management of police, discretion and ethics, recruitment and personality of officers, community involvement, women in the force, and challenges of policing in Canada; e.g., juveniles and street gangs.

INSTRUCTION:

Ten percent of the final grade will come from class participation. It is expected that students will come to class prepared and interested. We learn best from engaging with the material, applying the concepts and terms to relevant issues, and by having fun! This is also known as collaborative learning. Periodic tasks will consist of role playing, group fun, and brainstorming. Attendance will sometimes be taken and, at other times, groups will hand in a very brief summary of their discussions.

LECTURE SCHEDULE:

In the lectures, the instructor will assume that the student has read the required readings for the week. The lectures will complement, not replicate, the material. Key concepts will be elaborated on examples will be introduced that prompt students to *apply* what they are learning. The lectures will be interesting and exciting by referring to current issues, bringing in examples, showing relevant videos, inviting guest lectures, and by encouraging group discussions. *Class attendance is critical for success in the course*.

Tests consist of multiple choice, short answer questions, and long answer (essay) questions. For the long answer questions, students will have a choice to answer one of two questions. The tests are not cumulative. The tests will cover the material within the text, and **also** the additional information discussed in class lectures (including videos, handouts and guest lectures). Keep in mind that the text readings and the lectures' *complement* each other, that is, information in the lectures may not be within the text, and the lectures will not necessarily summarize all relevant points in the text. Therefore regular attendance is crucial.
