# **STREAM C – Direct-Entry**

# **Applicants Entering Directly from High School or Transferring from another Faculty/Program**

In order to obtain a Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Winnipeg, students must complete 90 credit hours of course work. Within these 90 credit hours, students must complete a Major, and must fulfill the Humanities, Science, and Academic Writing requirements.

Upon successful completion of the program, students may apply to the Manitoba Child Day Care Program (Manitoba Family Services and Housing) for Early Childhood Educator (ECE) III classification.

# **Overview of Requirements for the BA**

**For Graduation:** Minimum 90 credit hours (courses completed at UW) Additionally, students will complete the required courses at RRC to earn an ECE Diploma (students will be granted credit for one year of the two-year ECE program on the basis of their UW courses).

**Major Requirement in Developmental Studies**: Minimum 42 credit hours (27 credit hours of Core and 15 credit hours of Specialization courses)

**Humanities Requirement**: (12 credit hours) See General Calendar: Degree and Major Requirements, 2b, for a list of courses which fulfil the Humanities Requirement

Science Requirement: (6 credit hours) See General Calendar: Degree and Major Requirements, 2c, for a list if courses which fulfil he Science Requirement.
Indigenous Requirement: (3 credit hours) See General Calendar: Degree and Major Requirements, 2e, for a list if courses which fulfil he Indigenous Requirement.
Writing Requirement: (3 credit Hours) All students entering from high school, except those exempts from the Writing Requirement, are required to take Academic Writing before their 42nd credit hour of study. The University of Winnipeg's General Calendar contains further information on placement and exemption.
Electives: (24 credit hours) courses taken to total 90 credit hours

**Maximum credit hours below the 2000 level:** Of the 90 credit hours of University courses required for the BA, students may include a maximum of 42 credit hours below the 2000 level (i.e., first year courses).

# **Program of Studies**

Year 1: **30 credit hours** of introductory level courses at UW, with **PSYC-1000** Introduction to Psychology highly recommended.

Year 2: Stream C Core courses at UW, and Practicum 2 at RRC/CUSB in the Spring

Year 3: Courses at RRC/CUSB (Year 2 of the two-year ECE program)

Year 4: Stream C Specialization courses at UW

- **2.** Students should check individual course descriptions in the University of Winnipeg General Calendar for information on prerequisites or other restrictions.
- SOC 1101/6 Introduction to Sociology is waived as a prerequisite for SOC 2115/6 Sociology of Socialization and Development and SOC 2103/3 Sociology of Families and SOC-3303(3) Globalization and Families.
- **4.** There is **42 credit-hour limit on 1000 level courses.** Check the 1000-level prerequisite for 2000 and 3000-level courses and select your Humanities and Science courses accordingly.
- 5. Students entering from high school or the work force are advised to take any first-year Science course, PSYC-1000(6) Introductory Psychology, Academic Writing (if required), and Humanities electives in the first year of their program.
- **6.** Credit transfers of 24 or more credit hours from another institution result in an exemption from Academic Writing.
- Student must complete RRC practicum and ECE Diploma as a prerequisite for DEV-3610 Topics in Leadership ECCE and DEV-3630 Advance Internship.
- **8.** Completion of core courses, students are responsible for applying to RRC to complete the Spring Practicum and ECE Diploma Program.
- **9.** Student must apply to RRC as a regular student in order to be eligible to apply for the practicum.
- **10.** If students have 2 years experiences and are currently employed in a daycare centre they are exempt from the doing the spring practicum.

# Year 1

### The Spring Practicum

All Direct-entry students must complete a spring practicum at Red River College after completing the Core year in the Developmental Studies Program. The practicum runs from the end of April to early May to around mid-June. Four weeks of this block are spent at the work site, and the remaining time is spent in preparation at the beginning, curriculum activities, meetings, and debriefing.

Student must apply to RRC as a regular student in order to be eligible to apply for the practicum. They must also contact the Coordinator of the full-time program at RRC, Chihiro Jung at <u>cjung2@rrc.ca</u>

#### Year 3

Courses at RRC/CUSB (Year 2 of the two-year ECE program)

#### **ECE II Diploma Year**

Year 3 is spent at RRC, full time, and up on completion of the program, successful students will have earned their ECE II Diploma.

#### The RRC WorkPlace Program

An alternative to the regular Year 3 program is the workplace program, which is offered through the Department of continuing Education at RRC. Students who are admitted into this program are exempt from spring practicum in Year 2. Their courses typically run from September to the following June. The weeks are split into three days at the workplace, full time, and two days of coursework, which is also delivered through Distance Education.
