Learn how connections between German immigrants and Indigenous Peoples shaped the settlement process in the eighteenth-century government-planned townships of New York, Nova Scotia, and South Carolina as Dr. Andrew Zonderman shares his research into how settler colonialist impulses, and the desire for economic security, led thousands of migrants to take increasingly hostile attitudes toward Indigenous peoples, and how these stories reframe enduring narratives crafted by German nationalist and Enlightment writers of this period.
