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What is the Globalink Research Award?

The <u>Globalink Research Award</u> is a competitive international research opportunity for student travel to select Mitacs partner countries, including India. Projects last 12–24 weeks and are open to senior undergraduate and graduate students. Funding starts at \$6,000.

How to apply:

Identify all three project participants: student, supervisor in Canada, supervisor abroad. Submit your application form, research proposal, and supplementary documents to apply@mitacs.ca before the deadline. Full details are on our website, under the "How to Apply" tab.

Why apply?

- Flexibility: identify the participants you want to work with, the work you want to do together, and at what time of year
- Funding: minimum \$6,000 award supports student travel, living expenses, and research costs

The Government of Mexico is offering scholarships to Canadians for study or research at participating Mexican post-secondary institutions.



FONDATION PIERRE ELLIOTT TRUDEAU FOUNDATION

DOCTORAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Founded in 2001, the Foundation's mission is to support academic research, cross sectorial dialogue and leadership development in <u>four thematic areas</u>: human rights and dignity, responsible citizenship, Canada's place in the world, and people and the natural environment.

Each year, the foundation awards up to 15 scholarships to Canadian and foreign doctoral candidates pursuing research related to one or more of the above-mentioned themes. The value of a Pierre Elliott Trudeau Foundation scholarship is **\$40,000 per year for three years**, plus up to an additional \$20,000 annually to support research related travel. Each Pierre Elliott Trudeau Foundation scholar is paired with a mentor, an accomplished Canadian who has made an impact in politics, the arts, business, government, civil society, the judiciary or the media.

Candidates are evaluated based on their academic achievements, their desire and ability to contribute to public dialogue, their intention to work in areas of public relevance related to one or more of the Foundation's four themes, and their ability to engage in dynamic exchange with other researchers and scholars.

Pierre Elliott Trudeau Foundation doctoral scholarships are available to full time first or second year students registered (or in the process of registering) in a doctoral program in the humanities and social sciences. The Foundation awards scholarships to Canadian citizens registered full-time in a doctoral program in Canada, or Canadian citizens registered full-time in a doctoral program outside of Canada. Up to one scholar in four per year may be a non-Canadian citizen (permanent resident or foreign national) registered full-time in a doctoral program at a Canadian institution. This applies in particular to students from emerging nations.

The Foundation strongly encourages universities to submit a slate of nominees from the full range of disciplines within the humanities and social sciences. Past Foundation scholars have studied anthropology, communications, criminology, economics, environmental sciences, history, law, literature, management sciences, philosophy, political science, public health, social work, and sociology, among others.

The internal deadline to submit your application to Deanna England in the Graduate Studies Office is November 1.

NATIONAL PAPER COMPETITION

Canada's first 150 years have been marked by innovation and inspiration, which continue to be key determinants in defining our future. The Canada School of Public Service is inviting Master's and PhD students to participate in the National Student Paper Competition—an exciting high-level exposure opportunity that allows students to share their unique perspectives on the federal public service and the Government of Canada.

Through a 1,500-word essay or briefing note, students may respond to one or both of the following questions:

- 1. What are your ideas to help ensure that the public service will be ready to meet the needs of the future?
- 2. What are your ideas to advance the government's forward objectives?

The Grand Prize Winner, who is selected by a panel of senior public servants, will receive:

- an offer for a four-month paid placement within the federal public service;
- a VIP invitation to attend the 2018 Manion Lecture in the National Capital Region, with travel expenses reimbursed, if applicable; and
- an opportunity to present their paper on a national platform.

The majority of last year's finalists have found employment within the federal public service.
