# **General Information**

# **Applying for Admission**

All students must be admitted to the PBDE Program in order to register for courses. To apply for admission, students must submit the following documents:

- An online application form available on the University's website at http://www.uwinnipeg.ca/index/future-student-apply
- An application fee of \$90.00 (payable by check, money order, or credit card)
- Official university transcripts (students who graduated from UW, and have not attended any other institutions since, do not need to submit a transcript)
- Please see the application form for additional documents that may be required.

## **Visiting Students**

A Visiting Student is someone who is currently enrolled in a program of studies at another post-secondary institution, and who wishes to complete University of Winnipeg course(s) for transfer credit back to their home institution. To apply as a visiting student, you must complete the online application (check "Visiting Student"), and submit the \$90.00 application fee and an official transcript. You must also submit an official "Letter of Permission", approving your intended courses, from your home institution. If your home institution requires a course outline, please contact the Faculty of Education at 786-9962. Please be advised the course outlines may not be available until shortly before a course begins. Visiting students may only register for those courses listed on the Letter of Permission, and only if there is space available. Visiting students must have completed course work equivalent to any UW prerequisites. Certain courses, such as practicum courses in the School Counseling Stream, are not available to Visiting students. Please keep a copy of your Letter of Permission, in case you need it to register in courses.

## **Deadline to Apply**

November 1, 2017 – for courses that begin in January, 2018

Please note that registration for Fall and Winter begins in late June, and continues throughout the Fall term. Students are encouraged to apply early so that they may register before courses fill.

#### **UWSA Health Plan**

## Graduation

# **Applying to Graduate**

Students must apply for graduation, even if they do not plan to attend Convocation. All students must apply online for graduation through the new "Student Planning" online tool:

- Log in to WebAdvisor with your username and password.
- Click on Student Planning/Registration (under Registration).
- Click on the Graduation tab.

There are three Convocation dates each year. The following is general information. Please check the current UW Calendar for specific dates.

**Spring Convocation** — is typically held in June. Students must have completed all courses by April. The deadline to apply is February 1.

**Fall Convocation** — is typically held in October. Students must have completed all courses by August. The deadline to apply is August 1.

**Winter Convocation** — There is no formal ceremony, but degrees and diplomas are conferred in mid February. Students must have completed all courses by December. The deadline to apply is November 1.

## **Applying for a Salary Reclassification**

Please note that the following is general information only. The University is not involved in matters related to salary reclassification and employment. Questions should be directed to your employer, or to the Professional Certification Unit in Russell. Students must order an official transcript, confirming conferral of the PBDE, and arrange for the university to send it directly to the Professional Certification Unit. Information on ordering transcripts, and a link to the transcript request form, can be found on the university's website: <a href="http://uwinnipeg.ca/index/services-rcdstranscripts">http://uwinnipeg.ca/index/services-rcdstranscripts</a> Students are encouraged to order their transcripts when they apply to graduate, and request that the transcript be held until the PBDE is conferred at convocation. Each transcript costs \$13.00.

To be eligible for the School Counsellor or Special Education Teacher certificates, candidates must have completed the PBDE, and must have accumulated a minimum of two (2) years successful teaching experience while holding a valid Manitoba Permanent Professional teaching certificate. Students applying for this certification will also need to submit a "Verification of Teaching Experience" form available on Manitoba Education website: http://www.edu.gov.mb.ca/k12/profcert/handbook.html

# **PBDE** Requirements

# **General Requirements Applying to All Streams**

- Students must complete a minimum of 30 credit hours of course work to earn a PBDE.
- A minimum of 18 credit hours of 5000 level Education courses must be taken at the University of Winnipeg in order to meet the residency requirement.
- A maximum of 12 credit hours may be taken from other post-secondary institutions and, upon approval from the Faculty of Education, transferred to the University of Winnipeg.
- Generally, only formal university courses will be accepted for credit toward the PBDE. Except in cases where PD sessions have been pre-approved as part of a formal partnerships between the Faculty of Education and a particular school division.
- Students must achieve a minimum overall grade point average of 2.5 (C+).

#### **Provincial Certification**

#### **School Counselor**

Students who complete the School Counseling Stream may apply to Manitoba Education for a School Counselor Certificate. In order to be eligible for certification, students must have completed the 30 credit hour PBDE, and must have accumulated a minimum of two years successful teaching experience while holding a valid Manitoba Permanent Professional teaching certificate.

## **Special Education Teacher**

Students who complete the Special Education Stream may apply to Manitoba Education for a Special Education Teacher Certificate. In order to be eligible for certification, students must have completed the 30 credit hour PBDE, and must have accumulated a minimum of two years successful teaching experience while holding a valid Manitoba Permanent Professional teaching certificate.

## **Special Education Coordinator**

A Special Education Coordinator certificate may be given when the candidate:

- Holds a valid Manitoba Special Education Teacher's Certificate
- Completes five (5) years of approved experience in two or more of the following areas:
- Regular classroom teaching,
- Resource or special class teaching, or both,
- Approved clinical or special agency work at a professional level such as psychology, reading, social work, speech and hearing, and school counseling,
- Consultative or supervisory experience such as school administrator or department head. Requests must be made in writing to the Professional Certification Unit, and must include a statement from a current or former employer verifying experience.

# **PBDE Stream Requirements**

Students must have completed at least 15 credit hours of Counseling courses, including 12 credit hours of Core courses and 3 credit hours of Counseling electives, in order to register for EDUC-5426. Students must have one full day per week/cycle available in the Winter term to complete the 100 practicum hours. Students are typically placed in the St. James School Division.

## **EDUC-5001-001 ST: Teaching Math in Middle Years**

**Instructor**: J. Ameis

**Dates and Times:** Saturday, January 13, 9:00 a.m. to 2:45 p.m.

Saturday, January 20, 9:00 a.m. to 2:45 p.m.
Saturday, January 27, 9:00 a.m. to 2:45 p.m.

There will be a 1-hour lunch break on each day.

**Location:** 0AN70 (Basement Annex, Rice Building)

**Course Description:** This course concerns issues and approaches to teaching number-related matters of the Manitoba curriculum. This involves the four strands: Number, Shape & Space, Statistics & Probability, and Patterns & Relations. The goal is to enhance your understanding of 5-8 mathematics with respect to pedagogical issues, curriculum content, and implementation strategies. Topics include: problem-solving climate of learning; explanation of thinking; 3 stages of teaching; fractions; probability; integers and decimals; ratio and percent; miscellaneous number outcomes; and miscellaneous other strand outcomes. Typical class sessions are interactive. In other words, course delivery is not dominated by lecture mode.

This course is an elective in the General and Inclusive Ed streams.

## **EDUC 5001-002** Personal and Professional Dimensions of Educational Leadership

**Instructor:** L. Eblie

**Dates and Times:** This course will be held on five Saturdays throughout the term.

**Location:** Room: 1L06 (1st Floor, Lockhart Hall),

**Course Description:** Supporting the diverse learning needs and development of all students is a central concern of educational leaders. While academic progress is a key priority, student learning also requires feeling safe, well, included and respected. In this course, educators examine the complex repertoire of leadership approaches and skills that are required to address multiple and dynamic learning demands in schools. Participants should be prepared to self-reflectively engage with the personal as well as professional dimensions of educational leadership in exploring the daily demands and varied approaches of those who lead in schools. This course is an elective in the General, School Counselling, and Inclusive Ed streams.

## **Educ-5421-050 Theories and Issues in School Counseling**

**Instructor:** C. Pitura

**Dates and Times:** Monday, January 15, 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.

**Location:** Room 1L04 (1st Floor, Lockhart Hall)

Course Description: This course provides an overview of the fundamental theories of counselling including: Psychoanalytic Therapy, Adlerian Therapy, Existential Therapy, Person-Centered Therapy, Gestalt Therapy, Behaviour Therapy, Cognitive Behaviour Therapy, Reality Therapy, Feminist Therapy and Postmodern Approaches. Major concepts and practices of the contemporary therapeutic systems are addressed and ethical and professional issues in counselling practice are examined. This is a core course in the School Counselling Stream and an elective in the General and Inclusive Ed stream.

## **EDUC-5001-051 ST: Evaluating Mental Health in Schools**

**Instructor:** J. DeFehr

**Dates and Times**: Wednesdays, January 10 to April 4

5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

**Location:** 1L04 (1st Floor, Lockhart Hall)

**Course Description:** This course is designed to enhance guidance counsellor capacity to respond compassionately and effectively to individual student expressions of distress. Emphasizing both critical and practical understandings of Euro-American mental health practices and premises in Canadian schools, this course includes examination of school-wide mental health literacy programs; biomarkers, evidence, and legitimacy; psychoactive medication; normalization and dividing practices; anxiety, depression, suicidal ideation, and body acceptance. The course actively invites classroom dialogue and care will be taken to cultivate a safe, welcoming, and fun university learning community. This is an elective in the School Counselling, Inclusive Ed, and General streams.

#### **EDUC-5441-001 Inclusive Education 2**

**Instructor**: P. Harrison

**Dates and Times:** This course will be held on five Saturdays throughout the term.

Saturday, January 13, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday, January 27, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday, February 10, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday, February 24, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday, March 10, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

**Location:** 1L08 (1st Floor, Lockhart Hall)

**Course Description:** This course provides a more in-depth look at some of the topics covered in Inclusive Education I. Specifically, assessment, service delivery systems, and individualized educational and behavioral programming are examined in detail. We will also examine pragmatic issues such as reporting procedures and applying for special needs funding. The topics of classroom management and meeting the needs of at-risk children and youth will be introduced. Prerequisite: EDUC-5440 Inclusive Ed 1. This is a core course in the Inclusive Education Stream. Students in the General stream can take this course as long as the prerequisite has been met.

#### **EDUC-5445-002 Educational Assessment**

**Instructor**: P. Harrison

**Dates and Times:** Wednesdays, January 10 to April 4

5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

**Location:** 1L06 (1st Floor, Lockhart Hall)

**Course Description:** This course reviews current theories and applications of both formative and summative assessment practices for students in the inclusive classroom. Students explore standardized, normed, and criterion-referenced assessments and the interpretation of specific programming for identified students. This course gives students the opportunity to work with strategies and provides direction in working collaboratively with administrators, classroom teachers, students, parents and auxiliary professional personnel. This is a core course in the Inclusive Education Stream. Students in the General stream can take this course as long as the prerequisite has been met.

# **EDUC-5427-050 Supervised Counseling Practicum**

Instructor: P. Locken
Dates and Times: TBA

**Location:** Off Campus, TBA

**Course Description:** The practicum in school counselling provides an opportunity for students to synthesize the theoretical information on individual counselling and group counselling from their coursework and apply it in an early, middle, or senior years school setting. The course provides both a laboratory experience and a field experience under the joint supervision of a U of W supervisor and a site supervisor. The school counselling

practicum is designed to assist students in learning the function and procedures that accompany the role of a school counsellor through observation, shadowing, and reviewing relevant documentation. Students are required to conduct online lab sessions and class discussions throughout the practicum. Students are expected to complete a minimum of 100 hours at the practicum site.

#### **Prerequisites**:

- successful completion of all compulsory Core courses in the School Counselling Stream
- a grade of B or higher in EDUC 5426 School Counselling Practicum Skills
- demonstrated evidence of professional behaviour and ethical conduct.

Additional Information: Field placements are limited and placements will only be arranged by the Faculty of Education Placement Coordinator. Students may not complete their practicum in the same school division, or during the same hours, in which they work. Students registering for this course require permission from the Faculty of Education.
