# **Class Format of lectures:**

Classes will be comprised of lectures which will explain and illustrate important concepts with textbook content. The course will cover most but not necessarily all these topics listed may not be covered. Scheduled classes may have in-class discussions but group discussions may occur in any class. Change of the mode of lecture delivery may be required to switch to zoom pre-recorded class due to the availability of the instructor.

# **General Course Information/ Course Description:**

This course provides an introduction to the scientific analysis of behaviour and mental activity from the biological, social, and individual perspectives. Basic concepts and principles of individual behaviour are examined, particularly those major topics such as human development, normal and abnormal behaviour, social psychology, learning, perception, and psychological measurement. Unless specified, no recorded or live synchronous lectures will be given during the scheduled lecture times. Students are expected to participate directly or indirectly in the Department's ongoing research program. This course is a prerequisite for all other Psychology courses.

#### **Course Goals:**

This course will introduce students to a wide range of psychological concepts and principles, while encouraging scientific literacy and encouraging future participation in the study of the behavioural, cognitive, and biological bases of human behaviour. The following are the course learning goals:

1. Recognize important people and describe perspectives in the history of psychological science

2. Understand and explain good psychological science research practices

3. Describe theories and research on sensation/perception, consciousness, language, learning, memory & thinking

- 4. Identify how neural structures are connected to various psychological processes
- 5. Appreciate applications of psychological science to everyday life

# **Course Learning Objectives:**

Students in this course will be introduced to a broad range of concepts, principles, and perspectives within the psychological sciences. Lectures will involve an integration of classic psychological theories with novel concepts and innovative methodologies being used in modern psychological research. An emphasis will be placed on students' ability to recognize and differentiate the various psychological concepts, themes, and perspectives. Students will be encouraged to apply these concepts and perspectives in their lives and cultivate a meaningful understanding of human behaviour and psychology as a science.

If a final grade that has a fractional component will be rounded up if it is .5 or greater or rounded down if .499... or less. Final grade calculation formula:

# (Exam 1) x 30% + (Exam 2) x 30% + (Exam 3) x 30% + (Reflection Essay) x 10% = 100% course grade

**Final grades are final.** An error in calculating the final grade is the only reason that a grade will be adjusted. However, please note that that all cutoffs of grade range are tentative and may be changed in either direction by (i) the professor, (ii) the Departmental Review Committee, or (iii) the Senate, when circumstances warrant.

# More information on the component of evaluation:

# Examination

There are three examinations to test your knowledge of concepts and theories from lectures. Examinations are NOT cumulative. You must take the examinations between the start of class (i.e. 08:30 am) and the end of class (i.e.09:45 am) or during exam period. The exams are **closed-book** assessments, and you are not allowed to consult your textbook, study notes, or outside sources on the Internet. Any exceptions will be stipulated by the instructor. **Each exam worths 30% of your grade for Fall/ Winter Term 2023-2024**. Each exam will be composed similarly, mostly multiple-choice questions and some short answer questions might be included. Exams will include material from lectures and the textbook. More details will be given in class. The exams are **not cumulative**. If you cannot attend any of the examinations, please contact your instructor. Calculators, dictionaries, and handheld devices are NOT permitted during exams.

# **Guidelines for the Reflection Essay:**

Each reflection essay worths 10% of your grade for Fall/ Winter Term 2023-2024.

- 1. Length: The essay should be between 1,200 to 1,500 words, typed in Times New Roman, 12-point font, and double-spaced and upload to Nexus on or before the deadline.
- 2. Structure:
  - Introduction: Briefly introduce the psychological concept(s) or perspective(s) you have chosen to reflect upon.
  - Body: Discuss the concept(s) or perspective(s) in detail, drawing from course materials (Ch1-8 for Fall term 2023 and Ch9-16 for Winter term 2024). Relate them to personal experiences, real-life situations, or current events.
  - Conclusion: Summarize your reflections and discuss the broader implications of your insights.
- 3. Content:
  - Choose at least two psychological concepts, principles, or perspectives covered in the course (Ch1-8 for Fall term 2023 and Ch9-16 for Winter term 2024).
  - Integrate both classic theories and modern methodologies where relevant.
  - Provide a critical analysis, not just a summary. Discuss the relevance, strengths, and potential limitations of the chosen concepts.

# 4. Personal Reflection:

- Reflect on how the chosen concepts have influenced or can be applied to your own life, thoughts, or experiences.
- Discuss any changes in your perspective or behavior as a result of understanding these concepts.
- 5. Citations:
  - Use APA (7th edition) format for any citations.
  - Ensure that you reference course materials, lectures, and any additional sources you consult.
- 6. Originality:
  - Your reflection essay should be original and written in your own words.
  - Plagiarism will not be tolerated and will result in a failing grade for the assignment.
- 7. Grading Criteria: Essays will be graded based on the following:

- Understanding and Integration of Course Material (40%): Demonstrated grasp of psychological concepts and effective integration of course materials.
- Depth of Reflection (30%): Quality and depth of personal reflection and application.
- Organization and Clarity (20%): Logical flow, clear expression of ideas, and adherence to essay structure.
- Grammar and Mechanics (10%): Proper grammar, punctuation, and spelling.

# 8. Submission:

- Submit your essay via Nexus by Nov 30<sup>th</sup> 2023 before 16:00 for fall term 2023 and Apr 4<sup>th</sup> 2024 before 16:00 for winter term 2024.
- Late submissions will incur a penalty of <u>20% per day</u> after the deadline and submission will NOT be graded after 5 days beyond the deadline (Dec 6<sup>th</sup> 2023 for fall term 2023 and Apr 10<sup>th</sup> 2024).

# **Research requirement**

All students are expected to fulfil the research requirement by completing six credits worth of psychology experiments, or article review alternatives. The research requirement is worth 5% of the grade in the course and is based on a PASS or INCOMPLETE basis. "PASS" means you'll receive the 5% and INCOMPLETE means you'll receive 0%. In other words, when you earn 6.0 research credits in SONA, you PASS and receive the full 5% as your mark for the research requirement. If you have fewer than 6.0 credits at the end of the course, you receive 0% as your mark for the research requirement. Please review the Research Requirement document posted on Nexus along with this syllabus.

# Note that total assessment for each of the terms (Fall term 2023 and Winter term 2024) will constitute 47.5% of your overall grade. That means, the overall grade for PSYC 1000-005 = 47.5% (from Fall term 2023) + 47.5% Winter term 2024 + 5% (Research requirement) = 100%
