

Studies facilitates research and publishing in the human history of the Hudson's Bay Company territories known from 1670 to 1870 as Rupert's Land and the Columbia District, promotes awareness of the Hudson's Bay Company Archives in Winnipeg, publishes The Rupert's Land Newsletter, and co-publishes a series of documentary volumes on aspects of Rupert's Land history in partnership with McGill-Queen's University Press. The Centre puts researchers with similar interests in

touch with one another, keeps members and others informed about research projects and findings, and assists out-of-town researchers by introducing them to qualified local assistants and by providing a congenial meeting place when they visit Winnipeg.
