Kenora, Ontario May 26 – 30

Field trips

Field Trip A: Walking tour of Kenora. The fur trade is long gone but mining, fisheries, logging, the Canadian Pacific Railway and tourism have made Kenora a major economic hub in NW Ontario. Vignettes of the past are shown in twenty colourful murals. This tour will visit selected murals as well as historical buildings in the downtown area and continue on to the picturesque cemetery where guides will give entertaining biographies of early settlers. The tour finishes with tea at the Mather-Walls historic Victorian era house.

Field Trip B: Rat Portage and Tunnel Island Hike Five minutes by bus will take this tour to the original, 120 yard Rat Portage from Lake of the Woods to the Winnipeg River. The hike route covers Tunnel Island, still undeveloped, that forms the natural blockage of water from the Lake into the River. See Old Fort Island, site of the HBC post from 1836 to 1871, and the Norman Dam built on the fast flowing western outlet in the 1890s and Power House Dam on the east outlet.

Field Trip C: Boat trip to Fort St. Charles, Pierre de LaVerendrye's fur trade post established in 1732 on the NW Angle Inlet as his central post for exploring the west.. Boats leave the Lakeside Inn on Sunday morning; lunch is included at a remote camp on the Lake. Ft. St. Charles is in the United States, Passports required. Return to Kenora by 5:30 PM. This is an optional event with its own fee including a Fish Fry dinner Saturday night, boat trip and lunch on Sunday.
