FEATURES: The rich fur trade and Native history of the Pacific Northwest will attract speakers and sessions relating to the region, as well as providing wonderful opportunities for side trips and visits, to Fort Vancouver, French Prairie, Astoria, and other places of significance. A call for papers will follow later; as usual, we shall consider all proposals relating to the peoples and history of Rupert's Land and its borderlands, broadly defined. Theresa Schenck (see news of her reported below) has generously agreed to serve as our Colloquium Coordinator.

Check your mailing label to be sure your membership is current for 1999, so that you will receive further information as plans develop! And this is a good moment to find a calendar for the year 2000 and circle the dates May 24–28 for another memorable Colloquium gathering. Although the idea of a Scottish or Orkney venue did not prove feasible for the millennial year, we are contemplating possibilities in that direction for the year 2002.

Alison is doing research here and in Saskatchewan and Alberta for a doctoral dissertation under the supervision of Laura Peers, our former SSHRC post-doctoral fellow who is now on the faculty of the University of Oxford and the curatorial staff of the Pitt-Rivers Museum. Her research is described in this Newsletter, and she has given most interesting presentations about it to our History department and to my Honours seminar.

We have also been fortunate to have Dr. Theresa Schenck with us for a second year following her Fulbright faculty fellowship of 1997–1998; she has been teaching two courses in Native history and continuing her research on the Metis and

Brown) e-mail: rupert.land@uwinnipeg.ca www.uwinnipeg.ca/academic/ic/rupert During the summer of 1929, three men sponsored by the Cambridge University Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology (CUMAA), went on an expedition to collect 'specimens' of the material culture of the native peoples of the prairie provinces. Echoing the title of a rather better-known expedition, the trip was called the Franklin Motor Expedition (FME), and resulted in a collection of some seven hundred items, which have been in Cambridge ever since. The participants were Donald A. Cadzow, a former employee of the Museum of the American Indian, Heye Foundation in New York, and Robert and John Rymill, brothers from Penola, South Australia, who had recently completed their studies at Cambridge and London universities, respectively.

The FME seems to have followed a pattern common to other collecting expeditions of the era and, following the instructions of the Museum's Curator, Louis Clarke, gathered what were described as "old" and "representative" things (Cadzow-Clarke Correspondence). With a generous budget, a tipi to camp in and an air-cooled Franklin car, they set off across the prairies, to some places "where automobile never went before." In two months the FME drove from Winnipeg to Fort MacLeod, visiting at least ten First Nations reserves on the way, and the resulting collection of Ojibwa, Cree and Blackfoot articles is probably the largest single collection of its kind in a British museum.

I began working on this collection two years ago while I was the Documentation Assistant for the Anthropology Section at CUMAA. What was intended to be a small project to catalogue the collection more thoroughly has developed into a doctoral thesis, and I'm in the second year of research based at the School of Museum Ethnology, Institute of Social and Cultural Anthropology at Oxford

University, where Laura Peers is supervising the project. Right now though, I'm lucky enough to be here in Canada checking archival sources and talking to the families of the people the FME visited. Having already spent three months in Calgary at the Glenbow-Alberta Institute, I am now in Winnipeg where I am attempting to track down references to the FME in the HBC Archives and the Provincial Archives of Manitoba. I'm also looking at similar collections held in the Manitoba Museum of Man and Nature in order to identify any trends in collections made during this time period. I shall be spending the early summer based in Regina and will be back in Calgary by July, during which time I'll be visiting the same reserves as the Expedition team.

There has been a lot of detective work involved as, for a variety of reasons, the FME hasn't held a major place in the history of anthropology in Canada, and consequently isn't well documented in main-stream sources. However, by addressing the family histories of the many persons involved in the Expedition as well as textual documents, photographs, and of course, the collection itself, I hope to be able to better understand the relationship between museums and First Nation people during this period of Canadian history. In addition, I hope in the future to produce a comprehensive publication which will include details of the collection and the stories associated with the Expedition, and which will bring the collection to the attention of a much wider audience than has been possible to date. Meantime, I would be most interested to hear if any readers have ever come across references to the Expedition, and can be contacted via Jennifer S.H. Brown at the Centre for Rupert's Land Studies.

Ojibwa of the Red River region. As Theresa has a number of connections to the Pacific Northwest, she has agreed to serve as our Colloquium 2000 Coordinator. Opportunely, she has just accepted a faculty position at Washington State University in Pullman, WA, in the Department of Camparative American Cultures. Although Pullman and Vancouver, WA, are several hours' drive apart, she will be much closer to the Colloquium site than in Winnipeg! We Winnipeggers shall miss her, and we wish her all the best in her new job.

In early February, we were involved in co-organizing (with the Society for Applied Anthropology in Manitoba) a one-day conference on the Current Status of the Northern Flood Agreement that was reached in 1977 pursuant to Manitoba Hydro's building of dams and other structures that had severe impacts on several Cree communities and on waterways and ecology in northern Manitoba. Several of the ten presenters focused particularly on the problems confronting Pimicikamak First Nation (Cross Lake) which has yet to reach a settlement with Manitoba Hydro and the government signatories of the NFA. We hope to co-sponsor publication of the conference proceedings. Dr. Ronald Niezen, an anthropologist currently working for the Pimicikamak First Nation, is affiliated with The University of Winnipeg as a Research Scholar; he previously worked with the Cree of eastern James Bay and taught at Harvard University before moving to Cross Lake last summer.

We have been saddened since our last Newsletter to learn of the deaths of former Rupert's Land member Irene Spry, and of Elaine Gordon (Allan) Mitchell, fur trade historian whose book, Fort Timiskaming and the Fur Trade and articles on the fur trade are known and appreciated by many of us. This Newsletter includes an appreciation of Irene Spry contributed by Sylvia Van Kirk, one of the many beneficiaries of both her scholarship and her generous collegial spirit.


An Appreciation, by Sylvia Van Kirk

Members of the Centre for Rupert's Land Studies will be saddened by the death of Irene Spry, 16 December 1998, aged 91. For many of us, this was a personal loss as she was a truly inspiring mentor. I well remember when I first met her in 1970; I was a PHD student in London, researching in the Hudson's Bay Company Archives, then at Beaver House. I felt taken under her wing and was to enjoy many subsequent visits with her at conferences and also at her home in Ottawa. Her penetrating intellect was matched by her humanitarian vision; she was the most gracious person I have ever met.

Irene had a distinguished career which included teaching in the Department of Political Economy with Harold Innis at the University

of Toronto in the 1930s, and later at the University of Saskatchewan and the University of Ottawa. She is best known for her magnificent editing of The Palliser Papers for The Champlain Society in 1968, but her most significant work on the economic transformation of the prairie west in the 19th century will appear posthumously. Throughout her 80s, Irene maintained an active research agenda; increasing infirmity did not prevent her from wanting to check yet another footnote or engaging in stimulating debate with colleagues. Numerous younger scholars in sev-

eral disciplines benefitted from her enthusiastic counsel. She will be missed—but in her work on the history of Rupert's Land and in her inspiration of others she leaves an enduring legacy.



In September 1981, Irene Spry was a featured speaker at the first Conference on the Metis in North America at the Newberry Library in Chicago. Her paper on the Metis and Mixed-bloods of Rupert's Land before 1870 later appeared in The New Peoples: Being and Becoming Metis in North America (University of Manitoba Press, 1985), edited by Jacqueline Peterson and Jennnifer S.H. Brown. This photograph shows her at the conference, speaking with her customary articulate enthusiasm, while Olive Dickason (on the left) and Jennifer Brown (on the right) listen reflectively.

Selkirk Project Underway

Maralyn A Wellauer is collecting data pertaining to a select group of early Swiss emigrants who lefrt Europe in 1821 and traveled together to Lord Selkirk's colony in the Red River of the North in Western Canada, near present-day Winnipeg, Manitoba. Beginning in 1823, entire families relocated to areas in the Minnesota and Wisconsin territories, Illinois and Missouri. Others remained in the colony until 1826, when they too left for the United States.

The project focuses around a core group of 10 Swiss fmailies with the following surnames: Aebersold, Chatelain, Hofmann, Marchand, Monnier, Quinche, Rindisbacher, Scheidegger, Schirmer, and Stramm.

The North West Company: Frontier Merchants, by Florida Town (1999). Paperback, illustrated, 120 pp.

The Centre appreciates the receipt of a copy of this book from Umbrella Press, Toronto (Ken Pearson, Publisher). The volume is a popular history commissioned by the North West Company, which became the new name of the Hudson's Bay Company's Northern Stores Department when it was sold off in 1987.

Handsomely turned out, despite a few typos and errors, the book constructs links from the original North West Company through the 1821 merger of the Hudson's Bay and North West companies, on through the later history of the HBC and Northern Stores to the present. The perspective taken is very much rooted in the present. Much as Company President Edward S. Kennedy speaks of "repositioning an established company like ourselves" (p. 116), this history may be read also as a repositioning, laying claim to multiple pasts that are complexly interconnected. It is to be hoped that the book may betoken the rise of a deeper historical corporate consciousness which may foster North West Company support of historical endeavours across the wide northern regions from which it draws sustenance.
