COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an advanced filmmaking course synthesizing the various elements of film grammar explored in Filmmaking I towards the creation of longer complex visual narratives. Emphasis will be on scene blocking and sequence-building within an extended narrative with special emphasis on directing actors for the camera, the dynamic between the director and the performer in casting, rehearsals, and on-set, and the subtleties of screen performance. The course will also look at the importance of lighting in visual storytelling.

FIRST TERM

September 9 – Scriptwriting for longer dramas

Scripts will be graded on narrative structure, character development, dialogue and correct screenplay format. <u>First Draft due November 4</u> (Note: Final Draft is <u>due two (2) weeks prior to Day 1 of your assigned shooting dates)</u> This assignment is worth <u>10% of your final grade</u>.

September 16 – Sequential Perspective

<u>2nd Assignment</u> – Students will shoot a 1 to 2 minute film demonstrating sequential perspective (Assignment parameters TBA) **Due November 25**. This assignment is worth <u>15% of your final grade</u>.

LAB

Students will participate in a film shoot. The class will shoot a half-hour drama. Each student will be assigned crew positions during the shoot on a rotating basis: Director, Camera Operator, Gaffer, Assistant Camera, Boom Operator, and Craft Services. Students will also take on pre-production roles (Locations, Props, Wardrobe, and Production Manager) and post-production roles (Picture edit, sound edit and documentary edit).

All students must participate in the project. The lab is worth 30% of your final grade.

SECOND TERM

In the second term students will focus on completing the lab film and on their individual Major Film Project assignment. The first shoots will begin January 20. Students will have 10 days to complete principal photography.

Students will be expected to crew on each other's films (students may participate as Actors in each other's films, but this does not count towards the crew assignment). Students who are shooting may incorporate class time into their shooting schedules. Students crewing on a shoot will be excused from class for the day of the shoot. Students not working on a shoot will be expected to attend class.

<u>Late assignments</u>: Because the assignments are based on availability of equipment and the logistics of scheduling film shoots within a limited time frame, there is no margin for flexibility. Extensions will be granted only if arrangements have been made with the instructor **PRIOR TO THE DUE DATE** and only under **EXCEPTIONAL** circumstances and at the instructor's discretion. Work submitted late without prior arrangement will be graded at zero (0).

EVALUATION

Grade evaluation will be based on the 4 assignments (as outlined above), the lab assignment and class participation.

CLASS PARTICIPATION

Because the class meets only once every week for 6 hours, it is **ESSENTIAL** that students **ATTEND EVERY CLASS**. Students are expected to participate in class discussions and class exercises, and contribute to the set-up and break-down of equipment in class. Participation in the class film shoot is mandatory and students are expected to be <u>on-set for the entire shoot</u>. Students are also expected to participate in casting and rehearsal sessions and carry out their pre-production and post-production responsibilities for the class shoot.

Students are also **REQUIRED** to crew on their classmate's film shoots. Every student must participate in some crew capacity on at least **TWO** of their classmate's film shoots. Students must hand in a crew log

outlining the films they worked on, the dates they worked and their role in the production. (Students may participate as Actors in each other's films, but this does not count towards the crew assignment).

Crew log is due April 7.

IMPORTANT NOTE: READ THIS! All computer hard drives will be wiped clean as of APRIL 28, 2014. Make sure you are finished all your projects and have saved all of your files by this date. Hard Drives may also be wiped in January to make room for 2nd term projects.

<u>NOTE</u>: Cellular phones <u>MUST BE TURNED OFF</u> during classes, both in the lecture room <u>AND</u> in the editing room. Students discovered talking on their cell phones or texting during class time will be asked to leave the class. Ringing cell phones will be confiscated for the duration of the class.

COSTS

This is a practical hands-on course in filmmaking utilizing video and film equipment and students should take note of certain costs involved.

Students are required to buy the DV tapes they will be using for their projects. At a cost of approximately \$30.00 for each 120-minute tape, you may require 2-3 tapes, depending on the length of your projects.

There is a \$50.00 non-refundable Technology Fee to help defray the costs of regular equipment maintenance. You paid this fee with your tuition.

In addition to the non-refundable Technology Fee, students are required to pay a \$200 Damage Deposit for this class. In return, we will loan you our equipment for use on class projects. If you lose or damage equipment while it is in your care, the damage deposit will be applied to costs of repair or replacement, but note: you are responsible for the total value of the loss even if it is more than this deposit. Any unused portion of your Damage Deposit will be returned to you, usually by the end of June.

The deadline for payment of the Damage Deposit is <u>THURSDAY</u>, <u>SEPTEMBER 19</u>, <u>2013</u>. THERE WILL BE <u>NO</u> EXCEPTIONS. If you fail to pay in full by the deadline, a "hold" will be placed on your student file and <u>you will not be permitted to sign out or use any equipment</u>. In order to make payment, take the "Damage Deposit Ticket" handed out in class to Student Central by the deadline. Once you have paid, bring your receipt to Patty Hawkins in Room 3T03. You will be required to complete an *Equipment Loan Damage Deposit Agreement* which you must show to the Equipment Manager the first time you attempt to sign out equipment.

(NB: if you are taking more than one course requiring a damage deposit, you only pay the Damage Deposit once per academic year.)

Attendance and Class Participation: Attendance will be taken at each class and absenteeism will affect your grade. Also, students are expected to participate in class discussion.

<u>Class etiquette</u>: Be on time. It is very disruptive to the rest of the class if people are wandering in late, especially if films are being screened or workshops are being conducted.

"THE REAL THING" LECTURE SERIES

The Department of Theatre and Film is presenting a series of six lectures which will be held on Wednesdays during the free period (12:30-13:20) in Theatre 1T15. Please note the dates in your diary **NOW**: Sept 18, Oct 23, Nov 13, Jan 15, Feb 12, Mar 12. This series will feature speakers from a range of areas in the performing arts: technical, performance, design, management, film, directing, playwriting, etc. These speakers will specifically address issues related to "the business of the business."

Attendance for potential Theatre Honours/majors and for Film majors is optional but highly recommended.

Theatre is a communal art form in which a number of interdependent artists and crafts people co-operate to create a work of art. Any student failing to fulfil these requirements is harmful to the progress of dedicated students and may, after due warning, be asked to withdraw from any individual Departmental course.

COURSE CONTENT NOTE

All Theatre and Film Classes

Dramatic Literature depicts a wide variety of human action, both elevated and base, public and private, physical and psychological, sexual and non-sexual, etc. The Department of Theatre and Film will not undertake to censor the subject matter of dramatic works.

Students who have concerns about dealing with the full range of content and style in drama/film are urged to discuss these concerns with the course instructor.

Performance-Related Classes

Much of an actor's work is based upon actual experiences of life which become translated into fictional circumstances. Because of this, the teaching of acting may involve encouraging the student to examine personal and even intimate areas of life to help him or her access life experiences appropriate to the demands of the work.

Dramatic literature depicts a wide range of human actions, both elevated and base, public and private, physical and psychological, sexual and non-sexual, etc. Acting students must learn to simulate life truthfully in interaction with other students in the safety of the acting class and the rehearsal hall through exercises, discussions, and directions which address rather than avoid truthful, particularized, personalized action.

Performance classes often require strenuous physical activity. Classes may also involve physical interaction between students as part of class exercises or character development and occasional physical contact by instructors for purposes such as the demonstration of a technique or to make a posture correction. Students are responsible for wearing clothing appropriate to these activities.

Students who have concerns about dealing with the full range of actions and subject matter involved in drama are urged to discuss these concerns with their course instructor.
