PREREQUISITE or CO-REQUISITE: None. Either one of THFM-1001(6) or THFM-1002(6) is suggested.

The objective of this course is to offer an introduction to technical production in theatre through lectures, projects, and production work. Theatrical Production I is divided into two halves as follows:

- 1. Electricity in the Theatre, and
- 2. Stagecraft and Facilities.

Each half of the course is divided into lecture and lab sessions. During the scheduled lectures students will be exposed to principles of stagecraft, the handling of lighting and sound equipment, and the study of theatre facilities with an emphasis on the proscenium stage and the studio space. Considerations of safety in the handling of equipment and materials will be included throughout along with the introduction and use of the Workplace Hazardous Materials Information System.

Lab sessions will offer the student the opportunity of applying the principles acquired from lecture to hands-on projects and production work related to the departmental public exercises. In addition, in order to develop a broad experience in theatre, the student will be expected to participate in department activities beyond these supervised sessions.

Furthermore, the purchase of season tickets to the Manitoba Theatre Centre (Mainstage) is suggested. Part of our programme includes the study of theatre facilities for which we will be using MTC and its operational techniques as teaching tools. It is important that you observe these techniques as a member of the audience. Special season ticket rates will be available to our students in early Sept.

#### MINIMUM WORKLOAD Lectures: 4.5 hrs/week plus

Research/Readings: 1.0 hrs/week (estimated as a guideline)

In addition to the above, assignments and the production-related lab work may be estimated at not less than 35 hours for the year. This work is variable and will be dependent upon individual production schedules. The student will be advised of schedule details as they become available but should expect that such work will likely involve some evening and weekend time.

Students will be expected to have a 3-ring binder, a pencil, a geometry set, a 16ft. standard (Imperial) tape measure, and an Imperial measure (Architect's) scale ruler for every session.

# **TENTATIVE SCHEDULES**

There is no mid-term exam at the end of the Fall session and the final exam will be during the April exam period. The specific exam date and location will be posted by the University online.
