COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course offers an introduction to scenic painting. Lectures will cover responsibilities of the Scenic Artist: design interpretation, time management skills, budgets and construction materials, the effects of lighting on scenic elements, and the development of an execution plan. This course will cover both stage and film painting techniques and demonstrations of major painting techniques will be given throughout the course.

The workshop/lab sections of the course will provide an introduction to scenic materials and the use and care of scenic tools and equipment. The opportunity for experimentation with various techniques will be provided following demonstrations.

Three workshop projects and a final project will demonstrate skills and working practices developed throughout the course. Assessment of these projects will be based on the application of techniques, handling of the materials and equipment, and time management skills in addition to overall skill level.

The responsibilities of the scenic artist are such that punctuality, attendance, and completion of assignments are mandatory. The student will be expected to perform in accordance with professional standards in these respects. Class participation assessment will reflect this as well as the ability to work collaboratively on some exercises.
