COURSE DESCRIPTION

The objective of this course is to provide students with the basic concepts involved in arts and cultural management in a survey format. This course will provide a foundation to assist students in determining their developmental needs for meeting future career objectives in the arts.

The course is comprised of lecture and seminar sessions (approximately 30 hours) and these will cover basic concepts of management with an emphasis on not-for-profit organizations generally, and arts organizations more specifically. Lectures will be augmented by guest speakers and discussions with members of the professional community. An examination of the basic structure of arts organizations will provide a platform from which the role of the arts and cultural manager can be studied.
