## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

The objective of this course is to offer an introduction to technical production in theatre through lectures, projects, and production work. Theatrical Production I is divided into two halves as follows:

- 1. Sound and Lighting in Production, and
- 2. Stagecraft and Facilities.

The course is divided into lecture and lab sessions. Lectures expose students to principles of stagecraft, the handling of lighting and sound equipment, and the study of theatre facilities with an emphasis on proscenium and studio spaces. Considerations of safety in the handling of equipment and materials will be included throughout along with use of the Workplace Hazardous Materials Information System.

Lab sessions will offer the student the opportunity of applying the principles acquired from lecture to hands-on projects and production work related to the departmental public exercises. To develop broader experience in production, additional opportunities will be available for students to participate in department projects.

#### CRITERIA FOR GRADING PARTICIPATION

The criteria the instructor considers in assigning participation marks includes the following points (which reflect the above remarks):

- a. **Preparation**: Was the student prepared for class, including demonstrating she/he read the required readings in a timely manner?
- b. **Quality of the participant's contributions to the discussion**: Did the student contribute some relevant remarks about matters arising in the discussion?
- c. **Nature of the participant's interaction with others:** Did the student listen well? Did she/he encourage others to speak up? Did she/he ask helpful questions or offer useful follow-up remarks to keep the flow of the conversation polite and relevant?
- d. **Some negative points**: Excessive digressions; verbal or non-verbal hostility, indifference, boredom, ridicule; over-eagerness to contribute; refusal to put any views on the table; Facebooking, texting, emailing, and the like.
- e. **Environment conducive to scholarly interactions**: The student helped maintain an environment conducive to scholarly interactions (e.g. respecting fellow students, which is important since it is more likely to lead to lively debates and discussions). In other words, students helped generate an environment where all participants felt comfortable and motivated.
- f. **Attendance**: Students should note very, very carefully that in this scheme missing several class sessions will lower one's mark exceedingly. Even if your participation is very good, missing many classes can result in a very low participation mark.

## **TENTATIVE SCHEDULES**

There is no mid-term exam at the end of the Fall session and the final exam will be during the April exam period. The specific exam date and location will be posted by the University online. ### MINIMUM WORKLOAD

Lectures and Labs: 5.5 hrs/week plus

Research/Readings: 1.0 hrs/week (estimated as a guideline)

In addition to the above, assignments and the production-related lab work may be estimated at not less than 25 hours for the year. This work is variable and will be dependent upon individual production schedules. The student will be advised of schedule details as they become available but should expect that such work will likely involve some evening and weekend time.

Students will be expected to have a 3-ring binder, a pencil, a geometry set, a 16ft. standard (Imperial) tape measure, and an Imperial measure (Architect's) scale ruler for every session.

#### LAB DRESS REQUIREMENTS

A clean pair of sneakers or soft-soled shoes are recommended for work in lighting labs. High heeled-shoes, pumps, jewellery, and excessively baggy clothing are not permitted in the shop or in lighting labs.
