COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an introduction to the process of design, applying the principles and elements of design to the theatrical production. Students will explore the design process in projects involving analysis, interpretation, observation and presentation of concepts through a variety of visually expressive means.

The course also explores stage terminology so the student will be familiar with stage language and the technical means of realizing a design concept. Through attendance of local theatre, students will experience the works of professional designers becoming an informed audience member.

There are over 3 and a half hours of lectures and labs each week. The labs are structured to teach fundamental design skills in sketching, painting, drafting and model building. A knowledge of and exposure to these skills is essential to the design process and advanced design courses in the department.

- - *Terminology and concepts discussed in the textbook chapters will be the subject of the quizzes. To encourage participation in class, these quizzes will be completed prior to the chapter lecture.
 - Marks for these quizzes do not reflect against your overall grade but will allow you to revise a previously handed in assignment. With an 80% or higher grade on a quiz, you will have one week (7 days) to improve on a previously marked assignment. Revised and improved upon assignments can only increase 10% higher above given grade. Quizzes will be held during the lecture component of the class: please see schedule.
 - **Students will be required to attend three (3) off campus professional theatre productions during the semester. Along with being an informed audience member, you will need to be observant and sketch a moment in time of the scenic design and render at least one character in costume. Details about productions, cost and assignment particulars will be discussed.
 - Some projects will require you to present your work to the class. Projects will be presented to the class on the date that they are due. Late projects will be assessed a 10% reduction per day. After 48 hours, you will be assessed zero (0) marks for that project.
 - Assignment sheets will be available on the Nexus site and also posted on the design lab wall. The sheets include:
 - o Goals of the assignment and how it connects to the subject matter,
 - Assignment requirements use as a list for completion,
 - How the assignment will be evaluated: in the form of a rubric,
 - And textbook or online references for additional guidance.
