COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to theatre as an art form and provides a basis for further courses in all areas of theatre. Coursework will touch on key developments in the history of theatre, explore aspects of theatre production, and examine several plays in print and in performance. The goal of this course is for students to develop their capacity to analyze plays critically, with an enriched awareness of how theatre is and has been made and of how this relates to the range of meanings theatre can generate in different contexts.

COURSE DELIVERY

This course will be delivered through a combination of synchronous and asynchronous instruction, administered through Zoom and the course website on Nexus. Students will require reliable access to the Internet. We will meet together as a group at scheduled times twice per week (on **Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1 – 2:15pm**), via Zoom, for a combination of brief lectures and synchronous discussions. Lectures will be recorded for asynchronous access. These recorded lectures will be available to course members only, via NEXUS, until the end of the term. Students may choose to turn off personal cameras during recording. Students will have 48 hours to asynchronously contribute to online discussion threads and/or to complete activities arising from synchronous classes. Key factors for success in this course are preparedness and consistent, thoughtful participation. Timely completion of all assigned reading is essential.

Students have the responsibility to regularly check their UWinnipeg email addresses to ensure timely receipt of correspondence from the University and/or their course instructors.

PARTICIPATION

The following criteria will be considered in determining participation grades:

Preparation: Was the student prepared for online discussion? Evidence will include verbal and/or written contributions that are timely, specific, detailed, and thoughtful.

Quality of contributions to discussion: Were the student's verbal and/or written comments or questions relevant? Did they promote discussion? Did the student respect others, listen well, and respond constructively?

Consistency: Did the student contribute to verbal and/or written online discussion regularly throughout the term?

PERFORMANCE ANALYSES

Over the Fall and Winter terms, students will be required to write **five short, polished analytical papers** in response to each of the **required performances** assigned to this course (two live + three virtual). Detailed instructions will be posted to Nexus. Please note that **Performance Analyses MUST be submitted** *in advance* of our synchronous class discussions. **There can be no exceptions.** Work not submitted **before 1 pm** on the due date will be graded as 0%. At the discretion of the professor, students **may** be allowed to undertake an alternative assignment to make up for missed work. Be advised that these make-up assignments will be challenging.

PLAY RESPONSES

For each of the **four plays** we read as a class, students will be required to submit a **short, formal written response**. Detailed instructions will be posted to Nexus. Due to the nature of this assignment, which assesses familiarity with the play's content, play responses **MUST** be submitted *in advance* of class discussion of the play. Responses submitted after 1 pm on the date we begin discussion of the play will not be accepted. In such cases, a grade of 0% will be assigned.

TERM TESTS

Two end-of-term **tests** will be administered (see dates below). These tests will ask students to demonstrate their understanding of core concepts introduced in lectures, discussions, and assigned reading over the term. Due to the online delivery of this course, these tests will be administered **asynchronously** (i.e. as "take-home," "open book" tests). Consequently, a high degree of specificity and detail will be expected. Students are expected to complete these tests independently. Sharing answers and/or discussing the test with classmates in advance of the submission deadline will constitute academic misconduct.

Tests will be posted to Nexus **24** hours in advance of the submission deadline. Students must submit the test by the end of the official class period on the test date (2:15 pm on December 3 and March 30). Tests submitted after the class period has ended will not be accepted. In such cases, a grade of 0% will be assigned.

"THE REAL THING" LECTURE SERIES

Now based in Toronto, Yolanda graduated from Humber College's theatre performance program and was named one of NOW Magazine's artists to watch in Summerworks in 2016.

Further guests and dates will be confirmed in September.

Normally, attendance at **EVERY** lecture is <u>mandatory</u> for all Honours students in Theatre (4000-level courses, all areas), as well as students in THFM-3110-001 Screen Acting, THFM-3201 Styles in Design, and THFM-3801 Production II, and any other appropriate 3000-level course being taught in the term.

For the unusual circumstances of 2020-21, attendance is STRONGLY RECOMMENDED for all Honours students, 3000-level THFM majors, potential Theatre Honours/Majors and for Film Majors.

Please join TAFSA to find out more at their meetings, every second Monday from 12:30-13:20 pm (by Zoom or other platform in 2020-21). This is a great opportunity for students to connect with other like-minded people and a way to get involved in the department events.

BUILDING SECURITY

To safeguard the health of the UWinnipeg community — and support public health efforts — during the ongoing COVID-19 situation, the UW campus is closed until further notice. All academic instruction and evaluation will continue through alternate delivery.

The Asper Centre for Theatre and Film (home to the Department of Theatre and Film) is CLOSED as per Campus policy. Access for students attending in-person labs in our building will be arranged as necessary. All studios and labs are locked 24/7.

NOTE: It is <u>MANDATORY</u> that anyone attending labs or rehearsals in the building carry an ID card/student card to verify they are allowed to be on campus. If a Security Guard checks and you do not have proper accreditation, <u>you will be</u> evicted.

These rules are in place to protect our students and our equipment; please respect them.

RECORDING ON-LINE CLASSES

The instructor may choose to record a zoom or video class if there are online connectivity issues, absences, or to post to Nexus for later review.

If a lecture is recorded, students will be given notice (via the course outline or on a case-by-case basis) that their personal information may be captured; informed of how long the recording will be retained; and whether the recording will be used for evaluation of any kind. Students will also be given the option to turn off their cameras/microphones and use pseudonyms to remain anonymous (except where class participation is required).

Students with concerns or who wish to seek alternate arrangements may discuss the matter with the instructor.
