Congress 2014 of the Humanities and Social Sciences

More than 8,500 Humanities and Social Sciences academics (teachers, researchers and students) met at Brock University in St. Catherine's, Ontario for the 83rd annual Congress of the largest academic gathering of its kind in Canada, May 24-30. The Canadian Theological Society holds its annual meetings at Congress along with 75 other Canadian associations. The Society's meetings consist of academic presentations made by established and up-andcoming scholars from Canada in the wide field of Theology, followed by Q & A. Titles of these presentations included the following: "Friendship as a Philosophical Foundation of Theological Biography" – [focus on Bonhoeffer], "Taking Up the Past: Queer Temporality and Transformative Social Praxis," "Being at Borders with Paul Tillich," "A Sensuous Pursuit of Justice/Love: An Examination of the Erotically Pleasurable and Morally Formative Practice of Yoga," "The Politics of Decline and Retrieval: Bernard Lonergan's Foundations for Democratic Citizenship," "Literature as Theology: Recovering the Christian Religious Ideal with the Help of Victor Hugo's Les Miserables," and, "How Many is Too Many? A Theological Propaedeutic for Polyamory." As you can see by some of these titles the CTS meetings try to incorporate the wider Congress theme, which was "Borders Without Boundaries." There are lectures in each academic discipline, and "Big Thinking" speakers, open to any at the Congress. Lawrence Hill (*The Book of Negroes*, and 2013 Massey Lectures and book, Blood: The Stuff of Life) was a Big Thinking speaker for the second time in a few years. I enjoyed speakers Tim Cook ("The borders between life and death: Stories of the supernatural and uncanny among Canada's Great War soldiers.") and David Poltz—Editor in Chief of Slate ("Fast, cheap, and out of control: How the Internet has made journalism better than it's ever been.") This is an annual event held at Canadian University campuses across the country that I try to attend every year as an encouraging place to listen, question, contribute, and learn. It is a rich opportunity to engage not only new ideas in Theology, but also other related fields found at a unique gathering of thinkers, researchers, and writers in Canada.

The United Centre for Theological Studies (UCTS) of The University of Winnipeg and the Community Partnership Council of The Ridd Institute for Religion and Global Policy of the Global College, University of Winnipeg, is pleased to announce the signal honour accorded to **Ms. Belle Jarniewski** by her appointment to the prestigious International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA) and to offer her our most profound congratulations.

Belle is enrolled in the Master of Arts programme of UCTS, with a particular emphasis in Whole World Ecumenism and Dialogue Theology. She is also a founding member of the Ridd Institute's Community Partnership Council and a member of the *Group of 78*. She is the Chairperson of *The Freeman Family Foundation Holocaust Education Centre of the Jewish Heritage Centre of Western Canada*. Belle has previously served on the Canadian national iteration of the IH-RA, and has recently been elected to the Board of *The Manitoba Multifaith Council*.

The IHRA is an intergovernmental body whose purpose is to place political and social leaders' support behind the need for Holocaust education, remembrance and research both nationally and internationally.

IHRA (formerly the Task Force for International Cooperation on Holocaust Education, Remembrance and Research, or ITF) was initiated in 1998 by former Swedish Prime Minister Göran Persson. Persson decided to establish an international organization that would expand Holocaust education worldwide, and asked President Bill Clinton and former British Prime Minister Tony Blair to join him in this effort. Persson also developed the idea of an international forum of governments interested in discussing Holocaust education, which took place in Stockholm on 27-29 January 2000. The Forum was attended by 23 Heads of State or Prime Ministers and 14 Deputy Prime Ministers or Ministers from 46 governments. The Declaration of the Stockholm International Forum on the Holocaust was the outcome of the Forum's deliberations and is the foundation of the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance.

IHRA currently has 31 member countries and five observer countries. Membership is open to all countries, and members must be committed to the Stockholm Declaration and to the implementation of national policies and programs in



support of Holocaust education, remembrance, and research. Member countries are encouraged to develop multilateral partnerships and to share best practices.

The national government of each member country appoints and sends a delegation to IHRA meetings that is composed of both government representatives and national experts. In addition to the Academic, Education, Memorials and Museums, and Communication Working Groups, specialized committees have been established to address antisemitism and Holocaust denial, the situation of the Roma and the Roma genocide, comparative genocide, and special challenges in Holocaust education. The IHRA is also in the process of implementing a multi-year work plan that focuses on killing sites, access to archives, educational research, and Holocaust Memorial Days.

The IHRA has an annually rotating Chairmanship, and the appointed Chair is responsible for the overall activities of the organization. The Chairmanship is supported by the Executive Secretary, who is the head of the Permanent Office located in Berlin. The IHRA also has an Honorary Chairman, Professor Yehuda Bauer, and an Advisor to the IHRA, Professor Steven Katz.

One of IHRA's key roles is to contribute to the funding of relevant projects through its grant strategy. The purpose of the Grant Programme is to foster international dialogue and the exchange of expertise, increase government involvement in programme creation, and target projects with strong multilateral elements in order to create sustainable structures for Holocaust education, remembrance, and research.




